Based on Tuning methodology, this panel discussed the potential of the implementation of Tuning methodology, how it impacts in the policy making process and necessary changes to enable its implementation.

Recommendations:

We can make a better use of Tuning methodology by indenting activity in the future and spreading it over universities at regional level. We need to write policies in place, we need to write and implement a macroeconomic policy in such a way that we think about putting people first, because this entitles economic growth. The other logic would be to focus on growth and the look at the result, and some countries have done that, but this doesn't

generate any jobs. Of course the other focus is on skills, and here there everybody is interested in skills and education; if you speak to any policy maker in this region about what needs to be done, it's always education and training that comes out the first, the first response. The second priority, is about labor market policies; its about for example making sure that the young people have the same level of understanding what is available; another element is entrepreneurship, if we don't have enough jobs, see how we can create them, so it is time that there is a collective realization that this issue of entrepreneurship becomes at the core of the education system, so when you grow up you consider it as one of the possible options that is waiting you when you reach work. And finally a very important issue which is many times forgotten but it is still essential; it's to make this issue of rights at work available to everyone because it's something basic. If young people face more difficulties than adults when they try to find a job is also because of this combination; if this young people were aware of their basic rights, in terms of them knowing the conditions they should have, they could come in a much stronger position to negotiate and to feel on an equal footing with their potential employers.
